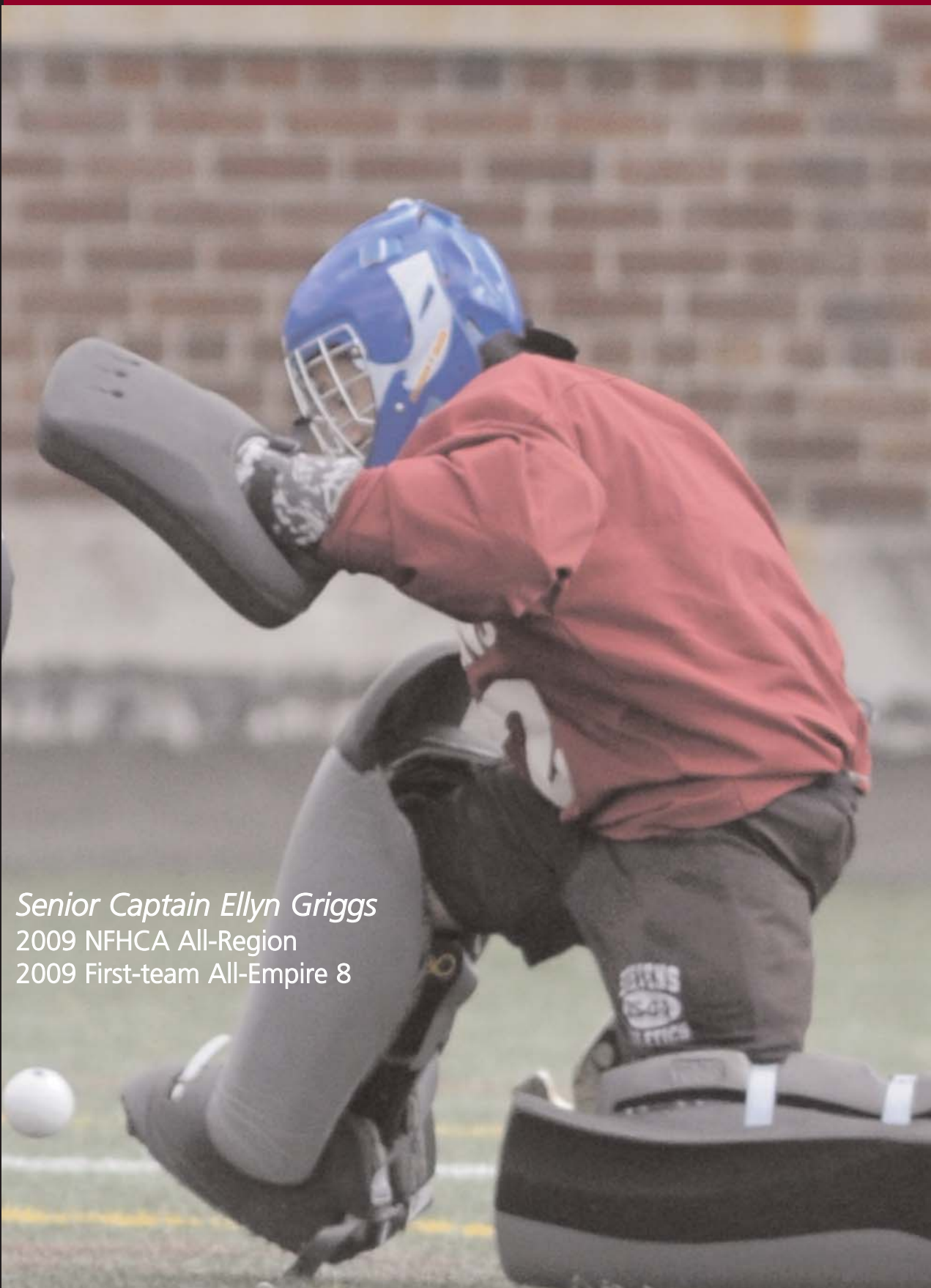

# Jessica Reed-Roach

*Head Coach \* Seventh Season \* American University '00*

Jessica Reed-Roach is in her seventh season leading the Stevens Institute of Technology field hockey program. She has taken a program that began with just one win in its first season to 60 over the previous four as the Ducks have won two-straight Empire 8 titles and appeared in the NCAA Division III Field Hockey Championship the last two seasons.

Last season, Roach and the Ducks continued their rise to national prominence. The team finished with an overall record of 17-4 and reached the NCAA Tournament. Stevens finished the year ranked 16th in the final Kookaburra/National Field Hockey Coaches Association poll and pushed its conference winning streak to 16 games. Stevens led the conference in scoring margin (1.22), scoring average (2.07), shutouts (eight), goals-against average (0.85), shots (320), shots per game (16.00), goals (44), fewest goals allowed (19), assists (27), and penalty corners (216), and over the last two seasons, the Ducks have outscored E8 foes 48-8, including an 8-1 edge in the '09 conference tournament. Senior Kara Borzillo was named the Empire 8 Player of the Year and earned second-team All-America honors, while four Ducks were named All-North Atlantic region and seven players were named all-conference. The team also earned the NFHCA Academic Team award for an unprecedented sixth-straight season.

2008 was also a great one for Roach and her Ducks. The team won the Empire 8, made the NCAA Tournament, and advanced to the Round of 16. The Ducks finished 19-4, were ranked 16th in the final National Field Hockey Coaches Association Top 20, and had three players earn All-North Atlantic Region honors. Allison Shields was the Empire 8 Player of the Year and Empire 8 Tournament MVP as seven players received all-conference accolades. In addition, Reed helped guide Hillary Paul and Shields to second- and third-team All-America honors, respectively. The team set

numerous program records and was ranked in the top 10 nationally in wins, winning percentage, and defense.

In 2007, Stevens had another strong year, going 13-7 and earning the first postseason victory in the history of the program over Washington & Jefferson College at the ECAC Tournament. Roach's Ducks also received the National Field Hockey Coaches Association Division III Academic Team Award for the fourth-straight season, and 11 different players were named to the NFHCA All-Academic team. The goalie of the 2008 squad, Stephanie Smith, was the first-ever Duck to garner All-America honors, and Smith and teammate Hillary Paul were the first two Stevens players to earn All-Region honors. Six members of the '07 team also received accolades from the Empire 8.

In 2006, Roach led the Ducks to an 11-8 record and was named the Empire 8 Coach of the Year. The Ducks opened the season victorious in six of their first seven games. They also posted wins against 2006 Empire 8 Co-Champions, Ithaca College and Utica College. She also helped produce six all-conference selections, and Courtney Geddis was named the Empire 8 Rookie of the Year.

In 2005, Stevens posted a 10-7 record, in which it avenged six losses from the previous year against Eastern Connecticut State University, Castleton State University, Ramapo College, The College of Notre Dame (Md.), Moravian College, and William Paterson University.

Prior to Stevens, Roach was a four-year starter at American University where she helped the Lady Eagles to a No. 12 national ranking. She was also a four-time member of the NFHCA Division I Academic Squad and a Colonial Athletic Association Scholar-Athlete. After graduation, Roach went overseas to play field hockey in London, where she was a member of the England Hockey League's Old Loughtonians during the 2000-01 season. Upon returning to the United States, Roach spent one year as an assistant coach at Georgetown University before joining the staff at Drexel University. During her time at Drexel, Roach helped the Lady Dragons to an 11-win season as well as a berth in the ECAC Tournament. On the sidelines, Roach served as an Under-16 Futures coach for the U.S. Field Hockey Association Olympic Development program from 2002 through 2009. She has also been invited to coach at the National Futures Tournament, the Junior Olympics, Regional Rumble, and the USFHA High School Open Camp. Moreover, Roach was the director of the New Jersey Field Hockey Garden State Games, which were hosted by Stevens Institute of Technology in 2005, 2006, 2008, and 2009. She also was a member of the NCAA Regional Advisory Committee from 2007-09 and chaired the Empire 8 Field Hockey Committee for two years. Roach holds a certificate from the first International Hockey Federation Field Hockey course and has a USA Field Hockey Level II Coaching Accreditation.

# Season Preview

Stevens, winners of the past two Empire 8 titles, will be eyeing a three-peat as well as the program's third trip to the NCAA Division III Field Hockey Championship in as many years. The Ducks have won 36 games over the past two seasons against just eight losses and the 2010 squad comes into the year as the 18th-ranked team in the nation. Leading the Ducks will be a trio of experienced captains in senior goalkeeper **Ellyn Griggs (Hillsborough, N.J.)**, senior forward **Lauren Griggs (Hillsborough, N.J.)**, and junior **Mallory Swanson (Princeton Junction, N.J.)**.

Ellyn Griggs was a first-team All-Empire 8 performer in 2009 and is one of the hardest workers in the history of the program. She was 17-4 between the pipes and compiled a goals-against average of 0.84. She made 82 saves and had a save percentage of .812 to make her one of the stingiest goalkeepers in the nation. Griggs and the Ducks' defense allowed a total of just 19 goals while pitching eight shutouts.

Lauren Griggs was the 2007 Empire 8 Rookie of the Year and is coming off a season in which she scored six goals, three of which were game-winners. For her career, the Hillsborough, N.J. native has 24 goals and a total of 49 points and will be looked upon to add to those numbers in 2010. Another hard worker, Griggs has shown great composure throughout her career and has a nose for the goal.

An extremely smart player that makes excellent decisions, Swanson has been a fixture on the field since arriving in Hoboken for the 2008 season. She possesses fantastic stick skills and has great presence on the field. She was a first-team all-conference selection as well as being All-North Atlantic region after scoring 10 goals as a sophomore. Swanson is extremely fit and will continue to be expected to have an effect on each game from end line to end line.

"Ellyn, Lauren, and Mallory are exceptional leaders and they represent what is special about our program," said Head Field Hockey Coach **Jessica Reed Roach (Southbury, Conn.)**. "Each is a great player and an even harder worker. They would do anything to see our program succeed, and I'm proud to have them serve as role models for the team."

Joining the two Griggs sisters in the senior class are three players that will be asked to lead the team back to the postseason. **Karen Federico (West Islip, N.Y.)**, **Alison Basile (River Edge, N.J.)**, and **Melanie Richards (Jackson, N.J.)** will all be essential to the Ducks as they try to replace Kara Borzillo, Elizabeth Zmijewski, Erin Broderick, Megan Clifford, and Jessica Ablonczy who were all lost to graduation. Federico has natural athletic ability and strong stick skills. She came to preseason camp extremely fit and has shown a lot of aggression. Another versatile performer that will have an effect all over the field, Federico will most likely fit into the Stevens midfield or defense. Basile rejoins the team after a year off and Coach Roach is hoping she will add an extra scoring punch in front for the Ducks. A scrappy, clutch player with a knack for changing direction on a dime, Basile will look to add on to her seven career goals and 15 points. A smart player with a knowledge for the game, Melanie Richards is a strong passer that figures to be a force in the Stevens midfield. Richards is returning from injury that kept her off the field in '09 but has shown solid skills and instincts, especially as a passer, throughout her career.

Junior **Jillian Price (West Islip, N.Y.)** is much improved since her freshman year and is one of the most athletically gifted players on the field. She has grown leaps and bounds as an all-around player over the last 18 months and should continue to see increased time and better numbers in 2010. A forward and midfielder, Price is coming off a year in which she scored three goals, handed out a pair of assists, and started 20-of-21 games. Junior **Meghan Broderick (East Setauket, N.Y.)** is one of the best ball distributors on the team and is very skilled and exceptionally smooth. A very consistent player that always knows what to do with the ball, Broderick scored two goals and dished out three assists in '09 and should see better numbers this year across the board.

Sophomore **Sam Weisman (Fairfax, Va.)** and Ellyn Griggs are the only returners on a nationally ranked defense this year, and Weisman will be asked to take on more of a leadership role this year. She played in all 22 games, making 21 starts and helping the Ducks' "D" to a goals-against average of 0.84 as a freshman and is expected to see more of a prominent role in 2010. She has excellent footwork to go along with strong communication and is also one of the best tacklers on the team. Sophomore **Marguerite Chavez (Ocean Port, N.J.)** was an all-conference performer as a rookie and was tops in the conference in points. She had nine goals - two of the game-winning variety - and 10 assists (28 points). A player that is fast and fearless, the Ocean Port, N.J. native is threat from all over and is never afraid to shoot.

Sophomore **Mary Nikish (Pittsford, N.Y.)** was solid last year, recording a goal and two assists in 19 games played. She improved greatly over the spring and summer and will figure into the Stevens attack this year. Sophomore **Catherine Jaroncyk (Manhasset, N.Y.)** came to camp in superb shape, with improved skills, and seems to be understanding the system very well. She figures to contribute on defense this year. **Mary Baldeon (Burtonsville, Md.)** is another sophomore that has gotten much better with hard work. A very aggressive player with solid stick skills, Baldeon should see an increased role as well this season.

A strong group of freshmen will round out the roster this year. **Rachel Chavez (Ocean Port, N.Y.)** is a scorer with a nose for the goal, and her high school, Shore Regional, is one of the best in the nation. **Katie Achilles (Portsmouth, N.H.)** has strong field hockey instincts and has impressed in camp, while **Caroline Packowski's (Jackson, N.J.)** stick skills and aggressive play has also turned heads. Packowski comes from the Spirit Eagles club team which is one of the best in the country. **Mary Simone Astarita (East Windsor, N.J.)** has also shown excellent field hockey instincts and ability and has also displayed a fearlessness throughout the preseason. **Lena DeAngelo (Bethlehem, Pa.)** reads the game well and is a strong tackler, and **Caitlin Chamberlain (Coronado, Calif.)** is a facilitator with field smarts and passing ability. The California native was an alternate for the United States Junior Olympic Team and was a National Futures Champion as a 16-year old. **Chelsea Cresci (Wilmington, Del.)** was an All-State performer and the Valedictorian of her class. She has adapted very quickly to the college game, has a strong shot, and is a well-rounded player. **Megan Traub (Berkeley Heights, N.J.)** seems to understand the system very well and is a good hitter in addition to performing well on both corner units thus far. In addition, **Grace Ridge (Moorestown, N.J.)** seems to figure into the defensive unit for Coach Roach.

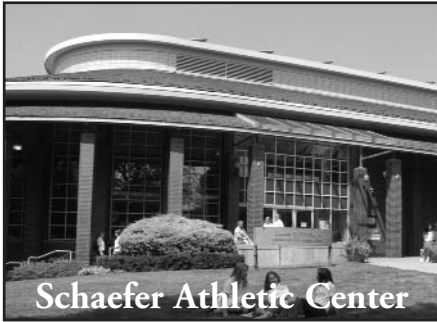

# Stevens Athletic Facilities



## THE STEVENS ADVANTAGE . . .

The Stevens Institute of Technology Athletic Complex is comprised of over \$20 million in facilities and caters to only 1,900 students.

Stevens opened its \$13 million Charles V. Schaefer, Jr. Athletic & Recreation Center in 1994. The Athletic Training Center contains a rubberized flooring which can accommodate soccer, tennis, basketball, volleyball and other activities. The second level contains the six-lane 25-yard De Baun Aquatic Center, a Jacuzzi, showers, locker rooms and an athletic training room. The third level features the Canavan Arena, a multi-purpose arena ideal for basketball, volleyball, fencing and other indoor activities. The top floor houses a fitness center containing cardiovascular and weight-training equipment plus a conference/classroom for video or personal instruction.

Walker Gymnasium re-opened in 2004 with its \$4 million modernizing renovation. The facility has central air conditioning, a state-of-the-art weightlifting facility, coaches' offices, five team locker rooms with showers, a recruiting lounge and many aesthetic upgrades. The main floor continues to house the basketball/volleyball court with a raised running track.

During the summer of 2007, the De Baun Athletic Complex underwent a major renovation as the existing NeXturf surface was replaced with state-of-the-art FieldTurf. This marked a significant upgrade to the surface and provided Stevens with a first-class outdoor facility. The De Baun Athletic Complex is home to a number of varsity teams and is used for intramural sports, physical education classes and recreation.

Furthermore, in 2007, Stevens reached an agreement to share the brand-new Weehawken Recreation Center and Waterfront Park, which is located approximately two miles from campus. This facility will be used by varsity and intramural sports as well as campus recreation.

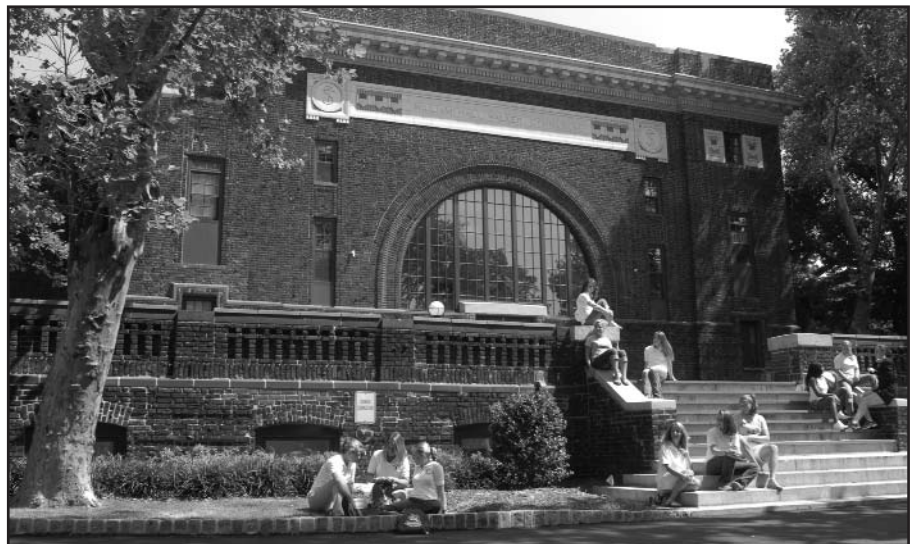
Stevens is one of few Division III institutions in the nation to establish a private strength and conditioning training facility (4,000 square foot) for exclusive use by its varsity athletes. Year-round strength and conditioning programs for each sport are devised through consultations between the sport's head coach and two full-time strength and conditioning coaches.
