Tim O'Donohue

*Head Coach * Tenth Season * Muhlenberg College '98*

The 2010 season is the 10th at Stevens Institute of Technology for Head Men's Soccer Coach Tim O'Donohue. During his time at Stevens, O'Donohue has registered a record of 150-20-19 and has led the Ducks to being one of the top Division III powerhouses in the country. In addition, Stevens has won seven-straight conference titles, appeared in the NCAA Tournament seven years in a row and is one of just two schools in the country to be ranked in the NSCAA Top-25 at the end of each of the past seven seasons.

Last season, Stevens compiled an overall record of 17-3-2, won the Empire 8 for the third time in as many years and advanced to the Sectional semifinals for the sixth time in seven years after defeating York College (N.Y.) and Montclair State University in the first and second rounds of the tournament. Three players earned All-America honors from the NSCAA and the Ducks were ranked in the top-15 by both the NSCAA (No. 15) and D3Soccer.com (No. 11) at the end of the season. O'Donohue helped junior Zach Carr earn first-team CoSIDA/ESPN The Magazine Academic All-America honors and was also named a first-team NSCAA All-American. The Ducks had the Empire 8 Player of the Year (Nolan Sandberg), and six players earned all-conference accolades.

The 2008 season was the best-ever for Stevens in many regards. The Ducks won the Empire 8 for the second time in as many seasons and advanced to the NCAA's. They defeated Rennselaer Polytechnic Institute in the first round and Rhode Island College in the second round. Stevens then hosted a Sectional where they advanced in penalty kicks over Johns Hopkins and 2007 National Champion Middlebury College. The Ducks reached the DIII "Final Four," crushed Amherst College, 4-1, in one of the national semifinals before falling to Messiah

College in penalty kicks in the National Championship game. The Ducks finished with a 19-3-4 record and one of the most exciting post-season runs imaginable. O'Donohue currently holds the best win-loss percentage of any coach at Stevens and ranks among the leaders for active coaches in the nation.

2007 saw the Ducks go 17-1-3 and win their first-ever title from the Empire 8 conference by defeating St. John Fisher College, 2-0. They also advanced to the NCAA Tournament. Stevens kept its conference and home unbeaten streaks alive at 49 and 59 games, respectively. In 2006, the Ducks had their best season to date in which they sported an amazing 18-0-3 record. They were one of only two teams in the country (York College) to go a whole season without a single loss. Furthermore, Stevens went undefeated in Skyline Conference play and went to the "Sweet 16" of the NCAA Tournament for the fourth consecutive year. The previous season, O'Donohue directed the men's soccer program to 14-straight wins - nine of which were shutouts. Stevens also made it to NCAA's for the third year in a row and fourth in its previous five attempts. In the 2005 NCAA Tournament, the Ducks were victorious in two games for the first time since the program's inception. O'Donohue's squad blanked No. 11 Eastern University and No. 9 Salisbury University by identical 1-0 scores before falling to No. 4 Trinity University, 3-1. Two years earlier, O'Donohue was tabbed as the NSCAA Metro Region Coach of the Year after guiding Stevens to a 19-2-2 mark, a Skyline Conference title and a berth in the Sweet 16.

As a soccer coach, O'Donohue holds an International Premier diploma with a distinguished pass from the NSCAA. He is also one of eleven coaches to take the NSCAA Masters Course.

A dedicated educator as well as coach, Lewis served as a full-time professor of literature and creative writing a range of institutions, including the University of Virginia, Colgate, Denison, and the University of Maryland - since graduating with a bachelor's degree from Trinity College (Conn.) and a master of fine arts from the University of Virginia. Brian Clarhaut is in his first season as an assistant on the Stevens Institute of Technology men's soccer coaching staff in 2010. The Medford, N.J. native will help Head Coach Tim O'Donohue in all aspects of the program. Ranked as a

top-100 player in the country in 2003, Clarhaut earned an invite to the Adidas ESP Invite and also had a fantastic high school and collegiate playing career. Clarhaut went on to play NCAA Division I soccer at St. Peter's College from 2004-2006 before suffering an almost career ending injury against the University of Connecticut. While there, he was a member of the All-Metro Atlantic Athletic Conference (MAAC) Academic team and played on two conference finalist squads. His club playing experience includes Philadelphia FC Coppa and FC Hawks. Clarhaut currently resides in Medford, N.J.

Ben Tamberella steps into his fifth season as an assistant coach with the Stevens Institute of Technology men's soccer team in 2010. Over the past four years, he has been part of a staff, which has directed the Ducks to a mark of 71-7-12

and four league championships (Skyline & Empire 8). A season ago, Tamberella helped the Ducks reach their sixth Sweet 16 in the history of the program as the team finished with a record of 17-3-2. Three players earned All-America honors from the NSCAA and seven were honored as all-conference by the Empire 8. In 2008, Tamberella played a big role in the Ducks' run to the National Championship game and second Empire 8 Championship in as many years in the conference. Prior to Stevens, Tamberella served as a coach for 16 years with the Hoboken Youth Soccer League.

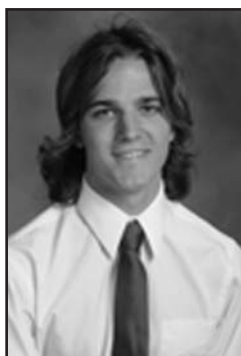

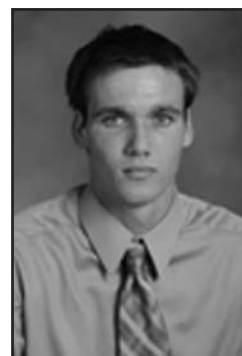

Season Preview

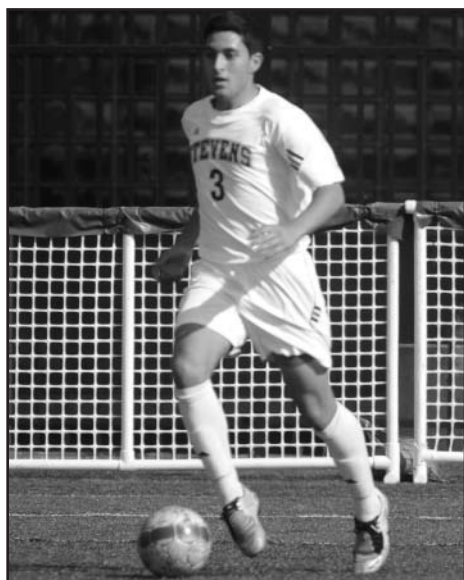
The Ducks are coming off a season in which they made their sixth trip to the Sweet 16 of the NCAA Division III Men's Soccer Championship, won their seventh-straight conference title, and finished with a mark of 17-3-2.

The Ducks will be led by a quartet of experienced and battle-tested seniors in goalkeeper **Zach Carr (Carmel, Ind.)**, back **Bryan De Faria (Hillside, N.J.)**, midfielder/back **Michael Quijano (Jersey City, N.J.)**, and the reigning Empire 8 Player of the Year midfielder **Nolan Sandberg (Grayslake, Ill.)**.

Carr is undoubtedly one of the best goalkeepers in the country and is coming off a season in which he was 17-3-2 in goal, recorded 16 shutouts and had a goals-against average of 0.31. He was a first-team National Soccer Coaches Association of America All-American and a first-team CoSIDA/ESPN The Magazine Academic All-American in addition to earning all-conference and all-region nods as well. Carr is already the program leader in goals-against average and shutouts (38), and he has an overall record of 53-7-8, accumulating 182 saves in his career.

De Faria is one of the Ducks' most consistent performers and had an excellent junior season after earning more and more time as a sophomore. The Hillside, N.J. native was a fixture in the Stevens defense throughout 2009 and was a huge reason the Ducks were ranked third nationally in goals-against average (0.31) and shutout percentage (0.73). He started 22-of-22 games and recorded one assist last year.

Quijano has seen substantial time throughout his time in Hoboken and had a solid junior season for the Ducks, scoring three goals and handing out one assist in 22 games. A versatile player that will see action in the midfield and along the back line, Quijano has been a strong leader since the end of last year. For his career, he has seen action in 50 games, tallying four goals and four assists.



Junior Tarik Kramcha

Sandberg came on strong for the Ducks in their run to the National Championship match and continued to be a force for the Ducks in '09. He made 18 starts in 22 games last season and finished with 11 goals - a team-high five game-winners - and three assists. The Illinois native got better and better as the year progressed and was named the Empire 8 Player of the Year in addition to receiving all-conference and all-region honors. Sandberg has tallied 45 points over the last two years, tallying 18 goals and notching nine helpers.

Four juniors will also be expected to lead the Ducks in 2010 in midfielder/back **Peter Bednarsky (Hackettstown, N.J.)**, forward **Zach Bowman (La Plata, Md.)**, midfielder/back **Benjamin Hirsch (Montvale, N.J.)**, midfielder **Tarik Kramcha (Denver, Colo.)**, and back/midfielder **Anthony Roden (Red Creek, N.Y.)**. Bednarsky has started 44 games and played in all 47 over his first two seasons in Hoboken, recording three goals and five assists. Bednarsky was all-conference as a freshman and sophomore and received an all-region nod in '09. Bowman saw action in 17 games as a sophomore and should see more of a role with the graduation of Terrence Johnson and Todd Sheridan. His great work ethic and athleticism will lead to time up front and in the midfield for head coach **Tim O'Donohue (Hoboken, N.J.)**. Hirsch has seen limited action in his first two years but put in a great deal of hard work in the offseason and has looked good in camp. His skills and increased strength should lead to more time. Kramcha is another player that has improved greatly over his first two seasons on the squad and he will help fill the void left in the midfield and defense by Sheridan, John Radvany, and Josh Williams. Roden was a starter last season in the middle of the Stevens defense and had an excellent season. He played in and started 19-of-19 contests and was another big part of a Duck "D" that was ranked third in NCAA Division III.

Sophomore **Zach Adler (McKinney, Texas)** is another Duck that will be a big factor this season. Adler was all-conference as a rookie and was one of Stevens' top scoring threats in 2009. He had 22 points on seven goals and eight assists and three of his tallies were game-winners. Adler put in a lot of work over the summer and will be looking at even more of an important role this year. Sophomore **Victor Daza (North Plainfield, N.J.)** is an explosive scoring threat with great speed. Daza played in 21 games, tallying four goals and recording three assists as a freshman and is another player that will be looked upon to fill the scoring void left because of graduation. Sophomore back **Tim Schaake (Southbury, Conn.)** showed a lot of improvement over the spring and summer and should see time along the back line for the Ducks.

Several newcomers have shown a great deal of promise in the preseason. Freshman **Leonardo Casas (Kearny, N.J.)** has impressed the staff and will see time as a midfielder and back, while fellow rookie **Zeke Hemme (Louisville, Ken.)** should contribute in the central midfield. Freshman **Stephen Dunbar (Atlanta, Ga.)** has been impressive across

the front line for the Ducks and should see action early on. Stevens has made seven-straight trips to the NCAA's and has won the Empire 8 all three years it has been a member of the conference. Overall, the Ducks outscored the opposition 45-7 in 2009, while outshooting the competition 414-187. The Ducks also went unbeaten at home and have not lost at De Baun. since Sept. 13, 2008.

Schedule

After a tough opener with NYU, Stevens will visit SUNY New Paltz before hosting the Stevens College Cup on September 10 and 11. The Ducks will take on William Paterson University and North Carolina Wesleyan College. Stevens will then welcome in-state rival The College of New Jersey on Wednesday, September 15 before hosting York College (Pa.) on September 17. The Ducks defeated TCNJ in a thrilling overtime contest a year ago and York gave Stevens one of its three losses.

After a match with Manhattanville College, the Ducks will open conference play on Homecoming weekend against St. John Fisher College (September 25). They will then play three-straight conference road games up in northern New York - taking on Rochester Institute of Technology and Nazareth College on October 2 and 3 before heading to Ithaca College to take on the Bombers on October 9. All three teams will be tough as Nazareth hosted the conference tournament a year ago and Ithaca the previous season.

Stevens host the United States Merchant Marine Academy on October 13 in a contest that will renew a rivalry formed when the two teams played in the Skyline Conference and the Ducks will close out their conference slate with three home games. They will take Elmira College (October 13), Alfred University (October 23), and Utica College (October 30). Stevens will also visit Rutgers University-Newark on October 19 and host SUNY Colege at Old Westbury on October 27 to round out its non-conference schedule.

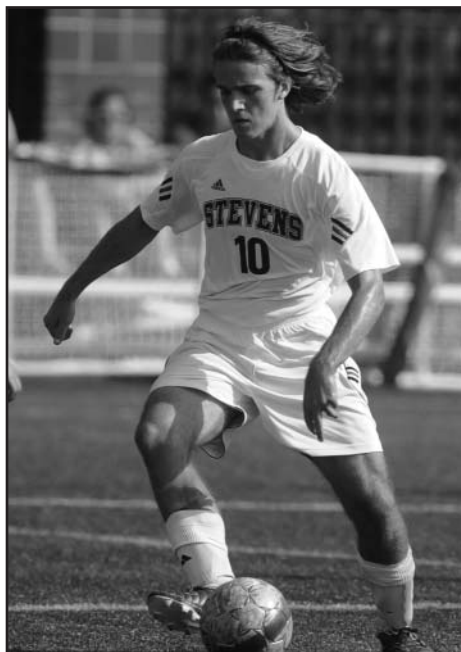

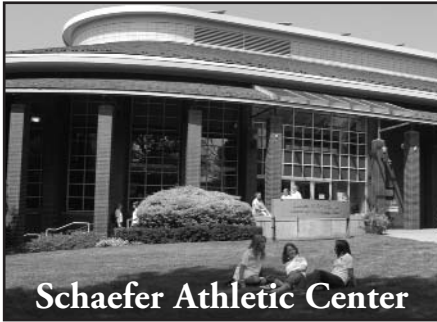

Stevens Athletic Facilities



THE STEVENS ADVANTAGE . . .

The Stevens Institute of Technology Athletic Complex is comprised of over \$20 million in facilities and caters to only 1,900 students.

Stevens opened its \$13 million Charles V. Schaefer, Jr. Athletic & Recreation Center in 1994. The Athletic Training Center contains a rubberized flooring which can accommodate soccer, tennis, basketball, volleyball and other activities. The second level contains the six-lane 25-yard De Baun Aquatic Center, a Jacuzzi, showers, locker rooms and an athletic training room. The third level features the Canavan Arena, a multi-purpose arena ideal for basketball, volleyball, fencing and other indoor activities. The top floor houses a fitness center containing cardiovascular and weight-training equipment plus a conference/classroom for video or personal instruction.

Walker Gymnasium re-opened in 2004 with its \$4 million modernizing renovation. The facility has central air conditioning, a state-of-the-art weightlifting facility, coaches' offices, five team locker rooms with showers, a recruiting lounge and many aesthetic upgrades. The main floor continues to house the basketball/volleyball court with a raised running track.

During the summer of 2007, the De Baun Athletic Complex underwent a major renovation as the existing NeXturf surface was replaced with state-of-the-art FieldTurf. This marked a significant upgrade to the surface and provided Stevens with a first-class outdoor facility. The De Baun Athletic Complex is home to a number of varsity teams and is used for intramural sports, physical education classes and recreation.

Furthermore, in 2007, Stevens reached an agreement to share the brand-new Weehawken Recreation Center and Waterfront Park, which is located approximately two miles from campus. This facility will be used by varsity and intramural sports as well as campus recreation.

Stevens is one of few Division III institutions in the nation to establish a private strength and conditioning training facility (4,000 square foot) for exclusive use by its varsity athletes. Year-round strength and conditioning programs for each sport are devised through consultations between the sport's head coach and two full-time strength and conditioning coaches.
