Patrick Dorywalski

Head Coach * 22nd Season * Farmingdale State University '73

Entering his 22nd season as head coach of the Stevens Institute of Technology men's volleyball team in 2011, Patrick Dorywalski's contributions to intercollegiate volleyball will be forever etched into the history books. One of the nation's leading instructors in the sport of volleyball, he started both the men's and women's programs from their inception at Stevens. Dorywalski, who owns a .645 career winning percentage, also stands as the school's all-time winningest coach in any sport with a combined 481 career victories.

Under Dorywalski's tutelage, the men's team has posted a 271-109 mark over the last 11 years while averaging 25 wins per season. They have also captured the North East Collegiate Volleyball Association Metro Division crown 10 times in the past twelve seasons. Subsequently, Dorywalski has produced a total of five American Volleyball Coaches Association All-American recipients, three CoSIDA Academic All-Americans.

Last season, the Ducks, ranked as high as fourth on the AVCA Coaches Poll, posted a 20-12 overall mark en route to its 13th-consecutive appearance in the NECVA Tournament. Three student-athletes earned All-NECVA Metro Division accolades under Dorywalski's tutelage led by then-junior opposite hitter SteFan PremDas who earned first-team recognition. Fellow juniors Brandt Grobeis and Timothy Karl each earned second-team accolades, with Grobeis, who served as one of the team's co-captains, also garnering CoSIDA/ESPN the Magazine second-team Academic All-America honors.

The 2009 campaign ranks as one of the program's best seasons to date. The Ducks compiled a 26-7 record en route to their fourth NECVA title and a Molten Division III Men's Volleyball Championship berth. Stevens defeated then No. 3 University of California-Santa Cruz before falling to No. 1 Juniata in the finals to finish the season ranked No.2 in the Bison/AVCA Men's Volleyball Division III Coaches Poll as the national runner-up.

Dorywalski helped produce two all-NECVA honorees and three AVCA All-Americans including NECVA Player of the Year and AVCA National Player of the Year Andrew Cranford.

In 2008, Dorywalski led the squad to an overall record of 21-12. The Ducks finished second in the NECVA Metro Region with a ledger of 8-2. Stevens reached the championship round of the 2008 Eastern Collegiate Athletic Conference South Region Tournament. Dorywalski assisted in producing an AVCA All-American in Cranford

as well as three NECVA Metro Region all-stars. Michael Bertucci received CoSIDA Academic second-team All-American honors for his performance both on and off the court.

In 2007, the Ducks posted a 33-6 record and captured the North East Collegiate Volleyball Association Championship for the third time in the last five years. They also went to the Molten Division III Men's Invitational Volleyball Championship for the third consecutive season but were defeated by top-ranked Carthage College and third-ranked Springfield College by identical 3-2 counts. In the end, Dorywalski guided two of his players, Michael Schulte and Tomas Bochicchio, to the AVCA Division III Men's All-America team.

The previous year, Stevens compiled a 27-12 overall record as well as a perfect 14-0 mark in conference play. As a result, the Ducks earned the top seed in the NECVA Tournament and notched a victory in the opening round as they blanked the City College of New York, but lost to 12th-ranked Eastern Mennonite University in the second round by a 3-2 count.

In 2005, Stevens went 25-9, which took them to their second NECVA title in three years. The Ducks also earned their highest-ever finish at the Molten Championship as they swept Medaille College in a third-place match. Ultimately, Stevens finished the year ranked No. 5 in the AVCA poll.

In 2004, the Ducks finished the season with a 33-4 record, while climbing as far up the national rankings as No. 4 – their highest-ever ranking in the AVCA poll. They also went unbeaten in NEVCA Metro play but were denied a return trip to the Molten Championship when they were downed by Medaille in five games in the semifinals of the NEVCA Tournament. Despite the loss, Dorywalski was able to rally his team and guided them to their first-ever ECAC South Tournament Championship.

In 2003, Dorywalski's team went 27-10, captured their first NECVA Tournament title and clinched a spot in the Molten Championship. Moreover, Stevens won 15 consecutive matches before the Molten and finished the season ranked eighth in the final AVCA Division III poll.

As a coach, Dorywalski has served on the ECAC Selection Committee and the NECVA Conference Executive board. He has also been the Chairman of the Women's Intercollegiate Athletic Conference League Volleyball Committee.

Formerly the women's volleyball coach at Stevens, Dorywalski built a great tradition by capturing three conference championships and producing numerous all-conference selections. Also, during his 14 years as head coach of the women's program, Dorywalski was named the Intercollegiate Athletic Conference Coach of the Year in 1992 and the WIAC Coach of the Year in 1993, 1995 (Co-Coach), 1996 and 1999.

Rounding out Dorywalski's coaching staff are assistant coaches **Jeffrey Lipton** and **Austin Voges**. Lipton, who previously served as a Stevens men's volleyball assistant coach from 2002-06, will return to the Ducks' sideline for the upcoming 2011 season.

Prior to Stevens, Voges served as a coach for the Long Island Volleyball Club (LIVBC). Since 2007 Voges has served as the Boys 16 National team coach. Voges has also served as the head junior varsity boys coach and assistant varsity coach at Lindenhurst High School in Lindenhurst, N.Y.

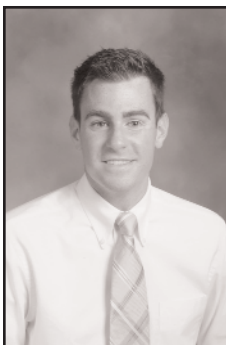

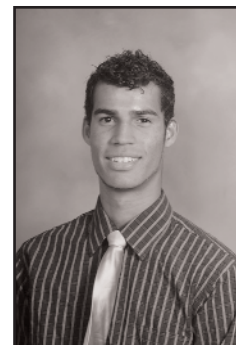

Season Preview

Coming off a successful 20-12 season and a 7-2 North East Collegiate Volleyball Association (NECVA) Metro Division slate, the Stevens Institute of Technology men's volleyball team enters the 2011 campaign ready to compete in the newly formed United Volleyball Conference (UVC). Under the tutelage of head coach Patrick Dorywalski, the Ducks will look to continue their tradition of excellence on the Hudson as they set their sights on the league's inaugural championship crown en route to a 14th-consecutive NECVA Tournament appearance.

The 12-team UVC, comprised of 12 outstanding NCAA Division III athletic and academic institutions, including Elmira College, Penn State-Behrend College, former NECVA Western Division members: D'Youville College, Hilbert College, Medaille College, Nazareth College, and SUNY IT, and former NECVA Metro Division members: Bard College, New York University, Stevens Institute of Technology, SUNY New Paltz, and Vassar College, will also operate as a division of NECVA.

"I believe the UVC could be one of the premier Division III volleyball conferences in the nation with the level of elite programs coming aboard. NYU, Stevens, Vassar, D'Youville, Medaille, and Nazareth – those, in my opinion, are consistently six of the top 15 programs in the country on a year-to-year basis," said Dorywalski. "We're definitely excited about the opportunity to be a part of UVC especially as we move towards the new NCAA Division III Championship in 2011-12. It's a great conference to be associated with."

Last season, Stevens finished in the top-25 nationally in five NCAA statistical categories, ranking third in blocks per set (2.82), eighth in assists per set (13.36), 12th in both kills per set (14.31) and hitting percentage (.267), and 24th in digs per set (10.65).

Returning to the Ducks this season are a trio of All-NECVA Metro Division honorees in seniors **SteFan PremDas**, **Timothy Karl**, and **Brandt Grobeis**. Averaging 3.24 kills and 1.51 digs per set, PremDas, a first-team selection who will look to continue to improve in his final season at Castle Point, proved to be a reliable threat from the outside, balacing out the Stevens attack.

Earning second-team, All-Metro Division accolades, Karl finished the season ranked sixth nationally in blocks per set with 1.26 per frame. The Williamsville, N.Y. native, who also averaged 1.90 kills per set, notched 116 block assists and 135 total blocks last season, ranking sixth and seventh all-time for any single-season in program's illustrious history.



A returning co-captain, Grobeis enjoyed another stellar campaign as a junior, racking up 1,267 assists – the fifth-highest total in school history. His 12.18 assists per set during 2010 ranked sixth nationally as he moved into third-place all-time on the Ducks' career helpers chart. A dedicated student-athlete, Grobeis also excelled in the classroom, garnering second-team CoSIDA Academic All-America recognition.

Also returning to the fold this season are fellow seniors **Jonathan Landis**, **Aaron Ostrovsky**, and **Bryant DeFranco**. Despite appearing in just 73 sets last season, Landis led the men's volleyball team in kills (4.10) and points (4.62) per set, ranking 10th and 20th, respectively, amongst all NECVA student-athletes.

An anchor on the Ducks' defense, Ostrovsky finished 16th in the nation in digs per set with 2.90 per contest and will look to improve upon that mark this year as the team's starting libero. A first-time co-captain, DeFranco made the most of his appearances last season, averaging 2.28 kills and 1.68 digs per set, and will look to take on a more active leadership role on this year's squad.

Hoping to build upon a solid foundation laid as freshmen are a talented corps of second-years in **Jake Modestow**, **James Mataras**, **Ricky Budar**, **Thomas Hannum**, and **Jon Rohan**.

Modestow made his presence felt inside last season, ranking 12th in NECVA in blocks with 1.08 per set. Mataras averaged 1.00 blocks and 2.19 kills per set, while Budar and Rohan saw limited action in reserve roles. Hannum made a good impression in his first full year at Castle Point, averaging 2.13 kills and 1.11 digs per set.

Rounding out the 2011 Ducks roster are five standout freshman: **David Evans**, **Tyler Mackanin**, **Paul Dubuke**, **Gary Aramini**, and **Ryan Seifert** – all of whom figure to contribute early and often to Dorywalski's squad.

Stevens opened up its 2011 season with a pre-season training trip to Europe. After arriving in Zurich, Switzerland on January 5, the team traveled to the National Sporting and Cultural Centre (Centre National Sportif et Culturel), better known as d'Coque, in Kirchberg, a quarter of Luxembourg City. Over the course of their five-day stay, the Ducks competed in the four-team Novotel Cup sponsored by the Volleyball Federation of Luxembourg.

Competing against the national teams of Luxembourg, Belarus, and Scotland, the Ducks took the opportunity to tune up for a rigorous 2011 NECVA slate, while enjoying the invaluable experience of international competition.

"This was a once in a lifetime experience for our student-athletes. To have the opportunity to play these international teams, in a national center, with our anthem being played in front of thousands of people is something they'll be able to hold onto, look back on, and never forget," said Dorywalski. "The team was a little jet lagged but still managed to play very well against Luxembourg. The middles were effective when we could run them, but the service was difficult to handle on the first day of competition. In our second match against Belarus - the clear favorite in the tournament - we played much better, but the sheer height difference was a factor as you can see in the blocking statistics. Our match against Scotland was a great match as we held our own and we were the only match that went five (sets)."

Following the tournament, Stevens headed to Friedrichshafen, Germany, to complete their training at the German Volleyball Federation's national training center before returning to Castle Point on January 17.

The Ducks open up the regular season by hosting the Stevens Invitational on January 22-23 featuring Hunter College, Mount Olive College, and Newbury College. Stevens will then travel to New York University on January 26 before facing Baruch College, Rivier College, D'Youville College, and Rutgers-Newark in the Golden Dome Invitational on January 29-30.

Stevens returns home on February 2, opening United Volleyball Conference play against Vassar before squaring off with new league rivals Nazareth and Hilbert on February 5-6 during the first of two Crossover weekends.

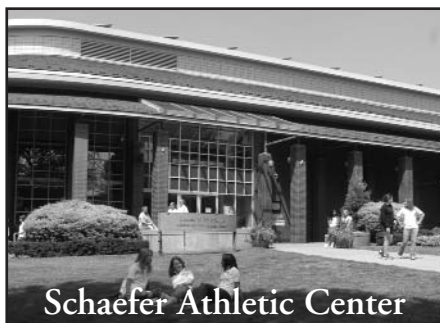


Stevens Men's Volleyball At Luxembourg's 2011 Novotel Cup

THE STEVENS ADVANTAGE . . .

The Stevens Institute of Technology Athletic Complex is comprised of over \$20 million in facilities and caters to only 1,900 students.

Stevens opened its \$13 million Charles V. Schaefer, Jr. Athletic & Recreation Center in 1994. The Athletic Training Center contains a rubberized flooring which can accommodate soccer, tennis, basketball, volleyball and other activities. The second level contains the six-lane 25-yard De Baun Aquatic Center, a Jacuzzi, showers, locker rooms and an athletic training room. The third level features the Canavan Arena, a multi-purpose arena ideal for basketball, volleyball, fencing and other indoor activities. The top floor houses a fitness center containing cardiovascular and weight-training equipment plus a conference/classroom for video or personal instruction.

Walker Gymnasium re-opened in 2004 with its \$4 million modernizing renovation. The facility has central air conditioning, a state-of-the-art weightlifting facility, coaches' offices, five team locker rooms with showers, a recruiting lounge and many aesthetic upgrades. The main floor continues to house the basketball/volleyball court with a raised running track.

During the summer of 2007, the De Baun Athletic Complex underwent a major renovation as the existing NeXturf surface was replaced with state-of-the-art FieldTurf. This marked a significant upgrade to the surface and provided Stevens with a first-class outdoor facility. The De Baun Athletic Complex is home to a number of varsity teams and is used for intramural sports, physical education classes and recreation.

Furthermore, in 2007, Stevens reached an agreement to share the brand-new Weehawken Recreation Center and Waterfront Park, which is located approximately two miles from campus. This facility will be used by varsity and intramural sports as well as campus recreation.

Stevens is one of few Division III institutions in the nation to establish a private strength and conditioning training facility (4,000 square foot) for exclusive use by its varsity athletes. Year-round strength and conditioning programs for each sport are devised through consultations between the sport's head coach and two full-time strength and conditioning coaches.
